After a brief time in Johannesburg, where we attended the ground breaking for the Johannesburg Temple, we spent the last few months of our mission in an area called Mitchell's Plains, near Cape Town. There we knocked door-to-door just as do the young Elders. The wide streets in Mitchell's Plains look as if Brigham Young had laid them out. We saturated the area with Latter-Day Saint literature and lessons and came away with many friends and happy memories. We pray that our work there may yet bear fruit.

Nevertheless, it was good to get back to America and see the five new Grandbabies who were born while we were gone, and find our children well and prospering.

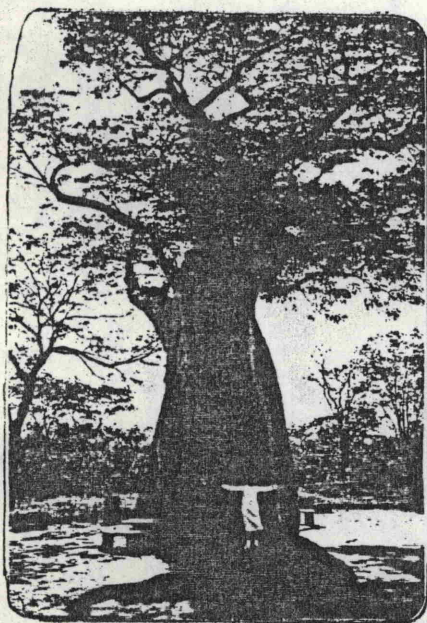
The world is full of turmoil and war. Yet all of us can find Peace and Comfort in the scriptures. One of our favorite is: St. Matthew 11:28-30:

To all of you, near and far, we send our warmest love and pray that all will be well with you and yours in the coming year. MERRY CHRISTMAS.



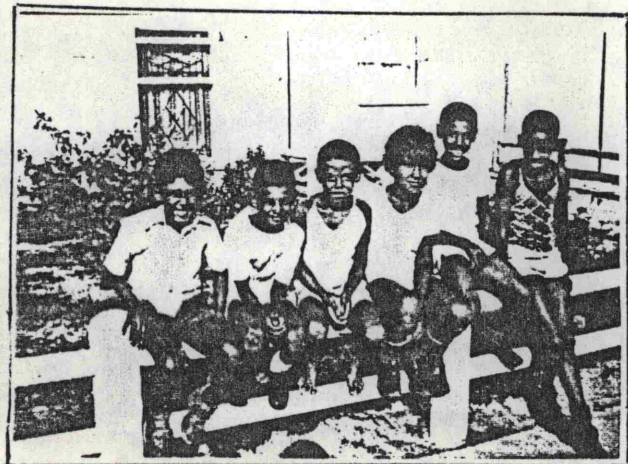

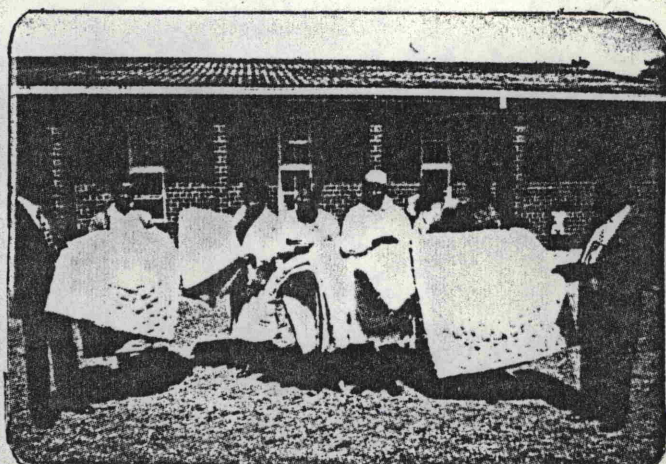
A Baobab Tree
