

"It should have been inspected after every trip, especially when used in that type of country." Hyatt said.

The sheriff also blamed the inexperience of the driver with the type of terrain in the "Impassable Country" between Escalante and Hole-in-the-Rock for the accident.





Scout Rules Ban Trucks, Says Official

Official Boy Scout policy for years has been to prohibit riding in trucks (except the cab for any person on any expedition officially sponsored or sanctioned by the

scout organization.

Thus declared Donald M. Huggins, director of health and safety, Boy Scouts of America, in a statement issued in Provo today after conferring with local scout

officials.

He pointed out that the expedition which claimed 12 lives Monday near Hole-in-the-Rock was "under the auspices of Socotwa Expeditions and not a Council-sponsored trip." Most of those in the truck were members of Explorer Post 36, Pleasant View Ward.

Ward.

Floyd Loveridge, Utah National Parks chief executive, told the Herald tiday the Provo group had been issued a travel permit by his office. He said, however, that ecout permits have rules prohibiting travel by open trucks, and that "there was no indication to lead us to believe this rule would be violated."

lead us to believe this rule would be violated."

The truck in question, heavily loaded with geal and nearly 50 people, was an open flatbed with a stake body or railing.

Socotwa School Expeditions started out several years ago as a trip-planning organization of the South Cottonwood LDS Stake. Since then, however, it has become an independent corporation with no official ties to any whard or church. However, one of its chief functions has been promotion of frips and tours for LDS groups.

Mr. Higgins pointed out printed rules governing Boy Scout trips long in effect, which forbid hauling passengers in trucks or trallers. It limits scoutesponsored expeditions to vehicles properly licensed as buses, and to passenger cars (with rules setting out driver-requirements and standards of maintenance and condition).






