## Mrs. De Gaulle Dies in Paris

PARIS (UPI) — Yvonne de Gaulle, the modest, self-effacing wife of the late French President Charles de Gaulle, died early today at the age of 79, almost nine years to the day after her husband died, her family announced.

Mrs. de Gaulle died at 1:30 a.m. (7:30 p.m. EST Wednesday) at Val de Grace military hospital where she was admitted twice this year because of reported heart trouble and blood circulation problems. She underwent operations at Val de Grace on July 4 and again Oct. 19.

Her family said that in compliance with her will, Mrs. de Gaulle's body will be transferred directly to the little village church of Colombey-les-Deux-Eglises, the country residence of the former Presidential couple in Lorraine province, where she will be buried alongside her husband and their daughter Anne.

Mrs. de Gaulle died just 24 hours before the ninth anniversary of the death of her husband. He died Nov. 9, 1970, also at the age of 79.

Because the quiet Mrs. de Gaulle no longer had the financial means to pay for the upkeep of the fabulous de Gaulle country retreat, La Boisserie, at Colombey-LesDeux-Eglises, 150 miles east of Paris, it was scheduled to be open to the public for the first time.

Mrs. de Gaulle lived modestly since the death of her husband, the World War II Free French leader and president of France during much of the 1960s, and several months ago moved into a Catholic church-operated nursing home in Paris.

De Gaulle refused to accept a pension as former president and relied on the modest pension of a brigadier general.



## Roger Judkins

He attended school in Cochabamba, Bolivia; Westmore School in Orem; American School in Mexico City, Mexico; Langley High School in McClean, Va. He was an active priest in the LDS Church.

He is survived by his mother of Orem, two brothers and sisters, Ronnie Judkins and Michael Judkins of Orem; Catherine Judkins serving a mission in Malan, Italy; Mrs. Bill (Alicia) St. John, Jewett City, Conn.; one grandmother and grandfather, Mrs. Cleon Judkins of Orem and Mr. Chancey H. Thompson of Ephraim.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 10:30 a.m. at the Orem 37th Ward Chapel, 164 E. 100 S., Orem. Friends may call Friday from 7 to 8:30 p.m. at Sundberg Mortuary, 495 South State, Orem, and Saturday prior to services at the church. Burial will be in the Ephraim City Cemetery.

Funeral services for Dr. Frank Taylor Reynolds, 84, of 1800 N. 500 E., Provo, who died after a short illness Wednesday, Nov. 7, 1979 at the Bunce Convalescent Center in Provo, will be Saturday at 11 a.m. in Berg Drawing Room Chapel, Provo.

Dr. Reynolds was a member of the Provo Kiwanis Club and of American Legion, Dean Mendenhall Provo Post 13. He was a veteran of World War I, having served as second lieutenant in the Medical Corps. He played in the Drum and Bugle Corps. At the time of his death, he was a member of the Pleasant View First Ward where he was a high priest. In his earlier years, he directed the choir.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Merrill (Annette) Biddulph, Provo; four grandchildren; seven great-grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Dell (Martha) Brimhall, Provo, and a half-sister, Mrs. Beth Miner, Orem.
