FUNERAL SERVICES FOR DR. FRANK TAYLOR REYNOLDS Berg Mortuary, Provo, Utah 84601, 10 November 1979 Bishop H. Tracy Hall, Pleasant View First Ward, Conducting

INTRODUCTION: We are gathered here to pay honor and tribute to Dr. Frank Taylor Reynolds who passed away in the 85th year of his age, Wednesday, November 7th after a brief illness. He has left us to join his eternal companion, Alice Deal Reynolds who passed away exactly five years before him.

We welcome all who have come here to pay their respects and to aid and comfort the family. We pray for the Lords spirit to be with us that Christ's love will penetrate our understanding in order that we will be aware of the reality of the ressurection and the nearness and concern of loved ones who have departed this life.

A nephew, Dr. Creed Brimhall, offered the family prayer in a brief family service just preceding this service.

Sister Jean Dixon has played the prelude music for this service and she will also play the postlude music as well as accompany a vocal trio consisting of Bonnie Dewey, Gayle Dudley, and Cathy Thomas who will perfrom later as is indicated on the program.

The prayers for this service will be given by brother Reynolds Home Teachers, Brothers Karl M. Skousen and Ross Wille.

Brother Skousen will now give the opening prayer and the remainder of these services will proceed as outlined in the program.

REMARKS: Bp. H. Tracy Hall

Frank T. Reynolds was born September 17, 1895 in Spring-ville, Utah, a son of Joseph Alonzo and Martha Rebecca Whittaker Reynolds. Both of Frank's parents had been widowed before their marriage and Frank had several "half" brothers and sisters in addition to his own "full" brother and three "full" sisters.

Frank grew up in Springville where his father was a merchant. You may have noticed the H.T. Reynolds building

which still stands on Main Street in Springville and, I think, is still Springville's tallest building. That was Frank's father's store.

Frank attended the Springville Schools through high school and when it came time to choose a career chose music. You probably didn't know that Frank played the piano and the accordian and was the main drummer in the American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps. In addition, he was the Choir director for one of the Springville Wards shortly after he was married to Alice.

However, two of his older half brothers talked him out of music as a career breause they felt that he would not be able to make a good living that way. Consequently, they financed his way through dental scool at USC and the graduated from there about 1919. Incidentally, the mercantile business of Frank's father had fallen on hard times during this period and Frank's mother was taking in sewing to survive. After completion of dental school, Frank paid his brother's off from earnings received in his practice.

Speaking of hard times, Frank along with other's had his problems during the great depression. Would you believe that he was filling cavities at one dollar apiece and that a tooth cleaning job cost fifty cents? Evenso, many people could not afford what seems to us in this day as a relatively small sum and consequently did the work for nothing or in exchange for small services from the patient or his family. Barter was also used. Chickens in exchange for dental services seemed to be very common. Frank also picked and sold grapes from his mother's farm in order to survive the depression.

With regard to Framk's dental work, it was first quality. People to this day still tell his daughter, Annette Biddulph, that his fillings are intact to this day and that they are continuing to enjoy his expert workmanship. It is to be noted that Frank retired from practice of dentistry in 1960, nearly twenty years ago.

As an aside, you have noted that I have been calling Dr. Reynolds "Frank". Let me assure you that this is an

endearing mode of address to me nad no disrespect of his formal title of "Doctor" is intended. Frank and I were great freinds for the past eighteen or so years. It all started as a result of the great Fourth of July celebrations that the Saints used to put on in Provo. I miss those celbrations and admit to being more than ticked off by the intervention of our government over the taxation issue involved in the conduct of this annual event. The government was far more interested in collecting taxes than in allowing the greatest Fourth of July event in the nation to flourish. Well, so much for my politcs. Of course, the Church no longer sponsers this event and as a result, the celebration has deteriorated.

Back to my story. I was a councilor in the Elder's quorum of the Pleasant View First Ward when we were meeting in the old chapel down on Canyom Road. It was our quorums responsibility to don straw hats a flamboyant vest and sell balloons during the parade on the streeets of downtown Provo. Frank had not been particularly active in the quorum at that time but I approached him anyway and asked him to join with me in wearing this ridiculous attire and peddling the baloons. I thought that Dr. Reynolds would likely turn me down. But he accepted willingly and we continued together to sell snow cones or balloons several seasons thereafter. Frank was completely unpretentious and willing to serve in a good cause.

Let me ennumerate some of Frank's other fine qualities. He was an optimist about life. He never complained even to the last day of his life when afflictions of old age were very troubling. Frank was kind and generous. He was patriotic and, as already mentioned marched in the Dean Mendenhall Post of the American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps for Patriotic events and was the main drummer. He howard and respected his parents misting them often.


