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on April 1st, 1853 Elders Jesse Haven, Leonard L. Smith, and William Holmes Walker climbed Lion's Head Mountain overlooking Capetown and dedicated South Africa to the preaching of the Restored Gospel of Jesus Christ. These three missionaries had been called to serve by Brigham Young at a special conference of the elders of the church held in the old Salt Lake City Tabernacle in 1852. It is

Interestingly, at that same conference 57 elders were called to serve in Europe, ~~44~~ to Asia, and 14 to serve in Asia.

on Sept. 15, 1852, the 3 South African Elders, Haven, Smith, and Walker said farewell to their families and travelled by wagon to New York City together with another 103 missionaries called to serve in various parts of the world. They travelled without purse or script and arrived at Cape Town via England on April 18, 1853 seven months after leaving Salt Lake City.

as they commenced their proselytizing efforts, they met immediate opposition from the local clergy and press but succeeded in baptizing 45 people within the next six months. Before they left in 1855, 176 people had been baptized.

~~We do not~~ We are not that successful today. There are currently a total of about 120 missionaries in South Africa and ⁸ in Zimbabwe. The yearly harvest is about 440 converts, which amounts to Comparing, by calculation, the to our present day efforts to those of Haven, Smith, and Walker, they were 8 times ^{more} effective.

Most of the converts coming into the church in Africa today are non-whites. It is difficult to convert whites

in South Africa and Zimbabwe. I made a comment concerning this in my journal on April 1, 1983, that may be of interest.

"Our mission zone held a braai (barbecue) today at Brother Nichols' home, high on the mountainside at St. James overlooking Kalk Bay. The view was, well, fantastic! You could see Cape Point, False Bay, distant mountains [the Drakenbergs], the sandy and [the] rocky beaches, the surf, wind surfers, swimmers, [sun bathers], [lovely] white clouds, and distant horizons - Also, other lovely homes, stacked on the hillsides. - I know why the ~~missionaries~~ work is so slow here. The people ^{already} think they are in heaven. And they are. Physically, the Cape is a Garden of Eden --."

There are four main groups of people in South Africa:
 (1) the whites (usually called Europeans) 17%, (2) the ^(Indians) Asians, 4%,
 (3) the Bantus (native blacks) 70%, and (4) the Coloureds (ranging from nearly white to nearly black) 9%. The total population is about 30,000,000 people.

It was our privilege to spend 5 months, traveling and teaching among the ~~cool~~ coloureds - often called Cape coloureds because most of them live in the Cape Province. Our assigned area was Mitchells Plain, a relatively new city of nearly 200,000 people. It is located about 37 km (23 miles) ^{southeast} from the center of Capetown and about 27 km (16 miles) from our Serengeti apartment in Mowbray. The Mitchells Plain has many miles of sandy beach fronting False Bay with nice recreational facilities. The city is well planned. It has 6 lane divided access roads, 6 lane main city roads, and 4 and 2 lane lesser roads. All roads have sidewalks on

both sides of the street. all streets are lighted. Electrical power is underground. Most houses have 3 bedrooms with a kitchen, dining room and living room. They have flush toilets, and hot and cold running water, refrigerators and electric stoves. While the lots are small, there is room to park a car, have a small lawn and flowers in front and a garden in back. They are heavily subsidized by the over government and sell for around \$12,000. They have nice schools, shopping malls, theatres, and recreational facilities and In addition to the fine road system for motor vehicles there is fast electric train and bus service to the area.

Mitchells Plain was opened up by Frank and Mawine ^{Rochdale} Hoyle, a missionary couple from Lancaster, England (Incidentally, their son, Frank Hoyle, Jr is the Bishop of ^{of England} Bishop in this area, and had 250 converts in his ward last year (1981). Elder and Sister Hoyle GQ'd (asked the "golden questions") a colored couple, Malvern and Beryl Cedras, at the Golden Acres shopping mall in Capetown ^{about} June of 1982 and obtained an appointment for a first discussion. The Cedras' and their 6 yr old daughter Marisa live in Mitchells Plain. Cedras' were converted. The Hoyles thought that Mitchells Plain would be a good area to tract and received permission to work there. A pair of young Elders were also assigned to the area. The area was considered too dangerous for sisters. There are about several 30 murders ^{every} week in M.P. ^{Mr. James Green, a member of the church of} By their own admission, that the Coloureds are a passionate, jealous, hard-drinking, crime-prone people. I believe it seems to be true.

The Hoyles later converted Edmund and Irene Brown, ~~an~~
who have three children (Natalie, Bernard, and Carmen) ~~to the church.~~

We took over from the Hoyles ~~the first week last week~~ in December 1982, around the first of January 1983. We continued the work there along with 2 young elders until the middle of May of 1983. Neither the young Elders nor Sister Hall and I saw ~~any Coloureds come into~~ ~~any converts to~~ the church. President G. Phillip Margetts, upon our leaving for home did not intend to replace us and the two young Elders were seeking a transfer and recommending that M.P. be closed down.

Well, we're sorry to not have had any baptisms. We ~~do~~ ^{only} hope that we've planted some seeds that someday will bear fruit. ~~among the M.P. Coloureds.~~ It was easy to Tracting ~~as~~ was easy in M.P. For example, our tracting record for the week of ^{such} ^{23rd} Sat, Jan 24, 1983 through Sat Jan 29, 1983 indicates the following:

We spent most of our time in M.P. tracting in the area known as Newportlands ^{although} ~~Referrals took us to homes in most of the other~~ M.P. areas. ~~so that we were familiar with the entire city.~~ Everyone who lives on Cambridge St. now knows something

about the church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Day after day we were there distributing tracts, Book of Mormons, and giving discussions, showing film strips, and praying with families. ~~The Halls~~ ^{We} and ~~those~~ ^{our} yellow Toyota were as familiar a sight on Cambridge St. as the Ice Cream man. The children followed us around as though we were ~~the~~ pied pipers of Hamlin. ^{We came to love the people on Cambridge St, and many came to love us.} They would follow us from house to house to see the film strips over and over again. We placed 130 copies of the Book of Mormon in the Cape; most of them in M.P. (Incidentally we ^{also} placed ^{thank you for your participation in} 50 BOM's in Zimbabwe)

Let me tell you about that program. You may be interested in how it ^{works} at the missionary's end. We give the book at any stage in the conversion process as the spirit directs. It might even be given as a door approach: "Mr. Brown, we are missionaries from America representing The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. We have a book that we would like to give you. It is called the Book of Mormon and is a gift from Mr. John Doe, a neighbor of ours in America. He and his family have enclosed a solo photograph of themselves ^{with} and a greeting ^{to you}, and ^{message concerning this book.} Let me read what friend, we send you greetings and our best wishes from America. Please accept this book as a gift from us. The BOM is a very important part of our family's life. It is the foundation of our faith and a collaborating testimony with the Bible to the divinity and mission of Jesus Christ. ^{one of our favorite} There are many sound parts in the Book of Nephi (especially chapter 17) which records the visit of Jesus Christ, after His resurrection, to His people in ancient America. We know that this book is true, and that you too, can know

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this for yourself. sincerely, John Doe, 1000 West Stadium
 ave., Provo, Utah⁸⁴⁶⁰⁴, U.S.A. -- Mr. John Doe would be very
 happy to learn that you have hear from you and to
 know may we come in and tell you more about this
 book?". This door approach will work in M.P. almost
 every time, even with Muslims. The colored people cannot
 resist something that is free. ~~they~~

at least a dozen^{MP} Coloureds heard all of the discussions,
 believed that Joseph Smith was a prophet, and that the BOM was
 true. But, they believed that their church was also true. Our
 hopes were always shattered this way.

We were the prime beneficiaries of our mission. For the
 first time in our lives we shared each other 24 hours a day
 consecutive
 for 578 days. Our love increased. So did our testimonies. I saw no
 heavenly beings, but
 several times ~~I~~ heard my name, just as surely as Joseph
 Smith heard his in the Sacred Grove, and received affirmation
 that I was doing the right thing in the right place at the
 right time and that the church was true.
