

ESCALANTE-Twelve Utahns were killed Monday afterwhen a large 21/2-ton stake truck carrying a party of 46 river runners overturned 47 miles southeast of here.

The accident, third worst in Utah's highway history, occurred when the heavily loaded struck started up a grade, stalled, then began rolling

The driver, Ernest Stephan Ahlborn, about 23, 845 E. 2950 North, Provo, told highway patrol officers he was unable to stop the truck from rolling backwards, that it rolled off the dirt road, over a 35-foot embankment, landed on its top, spilling the passengers and gear, then alid and rolled over on its side.
