We have missed hearing from your Did you enter the fair? Were you able to sell quilts this winter? I we not sell a quilts this winter? I we not sell a quilts this winter?

I have found someone who will handle some of the crocheted dresses, and if they sell (she handles it on consignment, that is I leave them and she sends me the money as she sells them) I will have more market for your dresses. Unless you need batting, however, wait until we see how they sell. Right now I have 128 dresses including those you have sent me and some Bob Chorley sent me which he bought with money I left in Zimbabwe which I did not have time to convert to US money before we left. Bob now lives in South Africa. This woman took 20 dresses and she thinks they will sell well, especially when the ski season opens later in the winter.

Remember the christmas ornaments I said I would like from there? I have enclosed samples of them, which have been made from the very thread you can get there. I unraveled it from a tablecloth which was not very good. It bulged in the center. (not yours)

I have enclosed a check on a New York Bank. It can be cashed anywhere in the world. Take it to your Barcley's bank, and take it to one of the white clerks, they will cash it for you. If you have any problem, take it to the U.S. Embassy. It is for \$25.

With the money from the check, buy one of those big balls of the same thread the samples are made of. Some of the samples (the starched ones) were made of white. I would want them made up of the same beige (off-white) thread. Take the thread and the samples to your best crocheter and ask her if she can make the bells. I doubt if she will have any problem with the other samples. I would like half of the ball of thread made into bells and the rest into the snowflakes. The three paper patterns I have duplicated from patterns taken from tableclothe which I have purchased in Zimbabwe and which should be familiar to the ladies.

Christmas is coming and I would like these as soon as possible for the Christmas season. If these sell well, I will order more. Phese should not be too difficult for a good woman woth do not know how many balls of thread go into a dress, but you mentioned in one letter that by the time you furnish the thread and pay a woman to crochet it, it costs you six or seven for the thread and \$10.50 for her to crochet it. These should be easier than a dress once she learns to do them, as they are the individual motifs, not joined, as they would be in a bedspread or tablecloth. So it should be satisfactory for her to be paid the same as if she were doing a dress with the same amount of thread in it. Use the balance to ship it to me air mail. If I did not send enough please tell me and I will send you the balance or material. The little white snowflakes sell for \$1.00 made up here in the U.S. so we will have to compete. I plan to line the bell with red and stuff it with batting. I will use nylon thread like on the snowflakes to hang them from the christmas tree, so don't have your lady crochet hangers of any kind.
