The accumulation of material possessions had increased since the inventory we listed on Joseph Kincaid, grandfather of James. The land was not listed, but was probably quite a large farm. Most of the children sold their shares in the farm to William M. When he sold his own farm in 1848, he sold "6 chares of 8 in 80 acres of Range #20, said interest being undivided except as to one of 2 shares owned by James A. Kincaid." (18 Dec 1848) So the farm in Camden was 80 acres, and apparently near to or adjacent to the land which William owned himself. This amount of land is quite a come-down from the acreage James Kincaid held in Kentucky, but was still too large to run efficiently himself.

If any of you visit Missouri, the county records of Marion and Boone and Andrew need to be searched for our people. I would appreciate any information which will help clear up the above families. There is still much to be done.

THE WILSONS

I do not remember at what point in our Kincaid research we tried to find the parents of Sarah, wife of James Kincaid. You will remember that during most of our research on James' and Sarah's families, we thought that the Lincoln County marriage for JAMES KINCAID to SARAH WILSON, February 4, 1784 was our family connection. GEORGE WILSON acted as surety to this marriage. Was he the father of Sarah?

In most of the printed marriages where there is a consent to marry from the father of either the bride or groom, it is listed along with the other data. In

The 1850 census of Andrew County, Missouri listed the following children for Harvey Kincaid and Rebecca: Mary K., Betsy E., James, Rebecca, Ary V., Cynthia and Robert.

The 1850 census of Marion County, Missouri lists the following for William M. Kincaid. (Note: In 1848 William and his wife MARY sold their farm in Platte County. Apparently they moved to Marion County, where the following census was taken. If this census is for our William, his wife Mary has died and he has remarried.) William M. Kincaid, fifty, Nancy J., twenty-five, Ruth J., John F., Susanna, William C., James, Laura F., Joseph. The children ranged from thirteen years to nine months, indicating that probably only the last, Joseph, would have been from Nancy, if Mary had died between 1848-50.
