Spent 2 hrs @ 6^{pm} at state museum.

Excellent display of native arts and crafts.

The Indian examples of basic Indian household items were amazingly beautiful.

They seemed to ornament most everything. Their food storage boxes - spoons - dishes - mostly beautiful in shape and form.

Very sophisticated forms. Nothing "primitive" looking. Spoons, knives, harpoons, carving tools, dishes, masks, etc. all show high degree of beauty of form.

The Indians + ~~Eskimo~~ carvers developed the arts of carving over many generations.

These carvers would train apprentices + carvers in Naida cultures had to stick to the forms they were entitled to by "inheritance" when making totem poles, so many of the carvers were from the "elite" of the tribes. David Latens had to represent family crest.

Dr. Gunn ~~was~~ acted as our tour guide in the most important part of the museum - the native cultural part and gave some insight.

The museum also had Indian + Eskimo canoes and kayaks on display. The ones ~~at~~ at the museum were skins sewn together + stretched over a

They had none of the ~~the~~ Haida solid cedar canoes, except for some "model" ones in the display.

One marvels at the ingeniousness & inventiveness of the natives in adapting to their environment.

The Alaskan Indians & Eskimos rapidly adapted western tools & implements as they became available to them & while they ornamented some of these, none of these later ~~people~~ implements were as beautiful as their early implements.

Dr. Lindquist rented a van and took 2 loads of BYU tour participants around Juneau. We drove up to the closest point to the Muir Glacier. It was our first view of the glacier. We walked as close as we could get & took pictures in the late evening sunshine. a beautiful day weatherwise and also experience-wise.

We also went out to a Catholic Chapel in the bank of the bay. The Salmon run is not quite on, but several boats were fishing in the inlet. The water was smooth & clear. Even the weeds are beautiful in Alaska.
