Banks close at 11:30 or 12 until 2 or 3 every

are frustrating but fascinating: the beauty, the

needy. The Moslem Mosque is in the center of a block
of shops. The "temporary" doors are always ajar
and we look hard as we go by. The Tamoul temples
are gaudy in comparison. We attended their
New Year's festival last week in a large open-
air theatre, 4 kilometers around the island. The
evening was beautiful with a gentle breeze, the
scent of flowers, and clouds making the moon
occasionally disappear. The skyline was a gentle
descent to the sea - not mountainous peaks as on
our side of the ocean island. The president of the
Tamoul Association and the announcer were tall hand-
some Indians both wearing white - pants and long
shirts. The musicians were also in white. The singer
chanted on and on with slight variations in his rendi-
tions. I was grateful for my preparation from the Cultural
Refinement lesson in Relief Society. The dancers were
beautifully costumed - sparkling pants with a fan-skirt
as they moved their legs; some in sarees. Exquisite!



We plan to attend next year - with the
Tamoul wife of a recent convert - maybe
"former Tamoul". We mentioned our fascin-
ation for the Tamoul celebration to a Hindu
friend who has offered to acquaint us
with their different New Year's activities
in October. And she speaks beautiful English -
she teaches it! We are looking forward
