in and these tradesmen were not hampered by the guilds as they were in England. Artisans & tradesmen lived closely with masters during apprenticeships & there was less social differentiation in America than in England.

Social restraints were different in N. England than in the South. In New England a single man or woman fared to live with families might consider this a restraint. The difference was they were self-imposed restraints placed by the society for its own protection.

Those who didn't comply in N. England were forced out. <sup>the N. England town meeting</sup> <sup>was a unique form of self government</sup>

In the South for the first two generations social or individual freedom was extensive. 1/3 of the women who married were pregnant. Because of lack of menials many couples set up housekeeping without benefit of hands.
