The X-rays showed that Dad had good thick cartilage & there was no X-ray

(3) evidence of any arthritic bone damage, which will help probably when they operate. I guess they call that being a good candidate for surgery.

(I just came into the recovery room where they put patients before & after surgery. The anaesthesiologist is here now getting a history.)

August has been a busy month. Everything had been pruned before we left, but it needed it again, badly. The Jay on the house had gone wild & had covered the windows so they couldn't be opened. It's cost us \$800 so far for pruning, etc. on the house. That's why we're eliminating some of the "need-tos". I don't want to spend that much time & money on upkeep. Besides it's going to get progressively harder for me to do it - or for your father to do it.

We pruned the arborescent hedges on the South. It looks terrible now but I can see signs of its recovery. The interesting thing is the day lilies response to the sunlight the pruning let in. almost as magic.
