

Ivory Storyknives - Bone used to tell stories  
- mud or snow.

Basketry - & twined basketry (1890's)  
material with rye grass. - baby baskets - boat ends,  
figurines - masks -  
2 sites only have yulid coil basketry  
mainly in places where traders active.

Coiled Basketry - began in 1960-70  
Sewing - Eskimo women living n. of St Michael  
& on Aleutian esp. famous -  
poor people even retchzi salmon  
skins.

Cormorant considered softest & most handsome  
skin for a Kadiak woman's parka  
used sinew & bone needles

new arts -

prod. in arts now limited to a few villages  
scarcely any ethnic handicrafts come from  
Aleutian, Koldiak Island or Pruvic Island  
sound. By early 1900's the Aleut & Pacific Ind  
had abandoned their arts.

In So. & N. the younger generation has taken  
art training & combine it with their heritage

model Kayaks -

Basketry - almost all women involved early but  
by 1971 could only find a few basket makers.

Strong resurgence of basketry art. esp. women of  
S. W. Alaska

Ivory Carving & Graphic Art & Wood Carving

not for religious or utilitarian  
reason.  
now art for art's sake.

just skin sewing.  
women now make dolls, but men  
starting in this new art.
