There was a strong relationship between Kinship and Enterprise in Rochester. Most of entrepreneurs were young men. They had left older members of family in other areas, but they shared partnership & capital interests with brothers & brothers in law.

Among the elite - (top 10% of income earners) there was a lot of cooperation & forming business relationships together.

As industrialization came into Rochester the old order of apprentices and servants living within the households of their masters broke down. These relationships between master and worker had previously been familiar, almost like family, now the worker lived in boarding houses and had little contact with the master who was becoming an entrepreneur.

For instance many carpenters worked for Nathaniel Rochester & built houses all over town for him but had little if any contact with him, only with foremen or overseers. Likewise with coopers & shoemakers. The trade & training for trades lost stability and dignity.
