

# DIAMONDS AND HIGH PRESSURE

H. Tracy Hall Distinguished Professor of Chemistry Brigham Young University Provo, Utah

Diamonds were first synthesized twenty-four years ago. Very high pressures along with simultaneous high temperatures were required for this feat that had eluded scientists for at least one hundred and twenty-five years.

Diamond grit of special quality not matched by nature was the ugly-duckling product of the first synthesis. About one hundred tons of this product, valued at around one billion dollars have been manufactured to date.

This lecture will cover the history of this development and describe the procedure and the machines used to transform graphite into diamond. The industrial uses of diamond will also be discussed. SCHEDULE FOR:




