We are planning to give these outstanding students as much time as possible to spend not only with the 1977 Chemical Pioneers, but also with past Chemical Pioneers who may be on hand.

We hope the occasion will be a most inspiring one (as have all past Chemical Pioneer Award Ceremonies have been) especially for the young students. A Chemical Pioneer (past or present) will be seated at each table during the luncheon.

To this end, I have taken the initiative to sponsor one \$10.50 luncheon ticket in behalf of a student awardee for the luncheon, and have so advised our new Executive Director at our National Office, David A.
